Archives 30: A New Future for our Queer Past President's Report Graham Willett

In this, the Archives' thirtieth year, we have been busily celebrating our achievements and working to lay the foundations for our future.

And what a lot we have to celebrate. At 30, the Archives is one of Australia's oldest queer community organisations. Across the decades, as groups and campaigns and activities have come and gone, we have soldiered steadily on: collecting and preserving this country's very queer past, and sharing it with the world. In doing so we have built and maintained one of the very few such organisations in the world, and one that can stand proudly alongside collections in places such as Toronto, Berlin, Los Angeles, New York and a handful of other cities.

We have established a reputation in the wider gay, lesbian, bisexual, trans and intersex communities – and indeed, beyond – as a trusted and trustworthy repository of memories and memorabilia and we have continued, under often trying conditions, to carry out our mission. In the past year we have strengthened our ties with institutions such as the state libraries in Victoria and South Australia, and the Museum of Victoria, and with scholars all over the country.

The collection continues to grow in size, scope and depth. Even the briefest summary gives a sense of what we have. The serials collection is perhaps the jewel in the crown and is the collection most often accessed; but we hold a huge selection of unique and irreplaceable items and collections produced by individuals and organisations.

So, there is plenty to celebrate – and we did. Our quinquennial dinner was bigger and better than ever. More than 200 of our closest friends turned up to share the night. Thanks to all who came along, and all of those who worked to make it happen.

Among those present were our new Patrons – Professor Dennis Altman and Joan Nestle. We are really pleased that they accepted our invitation to become patrons. Both are well-known for their contributions over the years (decades really) to the lesbian and gay and queer communities both here in Australia and internationally and we feel very privileged to have them as part of our team.

But 2008 wasn't all fun and games. The committee started this year with a review of the various challenges that we faced and determined to spend some time exploring our options of the future. At the heart of this was the question: does the community want us to continue in the current mode – as a not for profit, community-based, volunteer-run organisation, and, if so, what practical support is there to help us do this? Issues of membership and volunteering were important here. And on this basis we can report considerable achievements. Membership is now at 111, up from 84 last year. And as Daniel Marshall reports below, we have more volunteers than ever.

Money is always a slightly odd proposition for the Archives. We are used to getting by on very little but as we grow this becomes more difficult, especially for our preservation work. A couple of new fundraising initiatives proved successful. We received some \$2300 for administrative support and equipment purchases from the Grants to Voluntary Environment and Heritage Organisations scheme; and the specific purpose donation scheme, which lets people donating money tag their support to particular uses such as binding and book purchases has been very popular. Members and friends responded with generosity to our call for special, one-off donations too, as detailed in the Treasurer's Report. We were touched and grateful for these expressions of good will.

Our quest for Really Big Money and a Home of Our Own was less successful. But we are extremely pleased to announce that we have been offered more space at the VAC – a lot more space; space with natural light; space with room to spread ourselves out and for our long-suffering volunteers to work in some comfort. Setting all this up to best advantage will be one of 2009's main projects.

And we feel that we are getting the hang of approaching people, asking for advice and support, and we are planning on continuing with our Future Fund project in 2009. If you would like to join us in this, please just say so!

I want to end by thanking the Committee for its efforts. It has been a very busy year and without the efforts of Gary Jaynes, Daniel Marshall, Mark Pendleton, Esther Singer and Dan Vaughan literally none of what we have done this year would have happened.

Volunteers Daniel Marshall

The Archives has always relied on volunteers to operate and this continues to be the case. For thirty years now, our many volunteers have been collecting, compiling, cataloguing, listing, sorting and copying all sorts of interesting historical curiosities and documents. This year we have exceeded the Archives30 target we set for ourselves, attracting almost a dozen new volunteers. For example, Jamie Brown has been working hard on preserving our excellent Homosexual Law Reform Coalition collection of documents. Johnathon McLay has boldly ventured where no-one has gone before and catalogued our strange objects collection (including, yes, a penis-shaped jug – the stories it could tell!). Rachael Cilauro has been making great progress on sorting the film ephemera file. And Sofia Lo Bianco has been doing terrific work making sense of our ominously titled 'miscellaneous flyers' file. I would also like to thank Joan Nestle who volunteered her time to work with me on some of the queer history workshops we gave to youth groups as part of ALGA's Midsumma involvement – Joan also helped with listing one of ALGA's personal collections. We're grateful also to Jason Benjamin for sharing his archivist expertise in advising on a new acquisitions agreement.

Throughout our anniversary year we have worked hard to attract new volunteers and to let our ongoing volunteers know just how much of an invaluable contribution they make to the organization. At our 30th Birthday Party, Julie McCrossin and the committee led a round of applause for all of our tireless volunteers who really are the heart and soul of the Archives. Without you the Archives would be nothing! So, for all the volunteers who weren't able to be there for that wonderful event, I would like to convey the huge amount of love and affection for our volunteers that was evident in the Town Hall that night.

Old volunteers kept on keeping on too. Lee Johns has been cataloguing and indexing for some years now – if you want to know what's in Camp Ink, William and John, Stallion/Gayzette or Melbourne Voice (among others), the lists we have come to you courtesy of him. John Waugh has revamped and is maintaining the website and answers tricky legal questions. Graham Carbery's work as periodicals secretary keeps what is undoubtedly the jewel in the crown of the collection sparkling. Our attractive history walk programs wouldn't happen without Helen Pausacker – nor would much of the logging of ALGA's oral history collection. Wayne Murdoch in tandem with Graham W keep the history walks commentary reliably informative and entertaining. And to Liz Ross, thanks for a mountain of collection work over the years – most recently in listing ALGA's vast collection of national homosexual conference records 1975-86 (ten down, one to go!)

They probably don't think of themselves as volunteers, but people like Richard Watts, Colin Billing, Geoff A and Mannie De Saxe are a fantastic help in tracking down missing issues. The

many GLBT groups around Australia that send us gratis copies of their publications deserve a big thank you too – some of them have been doing this for decades. There are too many to name here, but you'll see them in the periodicals list.

And to our friends outside Melbourne - Greg B in Perth, Ian Purcell and David Hilliard in Adelaide, Shirleene Robinson and Yorick Smaal in Brisbane, Peter de Waal in Sydney, Phil Parkinson at LAGANZ in Wellington – thanks a heap for your support and the many favours in chasing things down for us.

There is not room here to detail all of our volunteers' contributions but we are grateful to all of you who donate your time to the Archives. We are also in the process of getting new volunteers started and we always need more! So if you are interested in volunteering please contact me (daniel.marshall@latrobe.edu.au). I will sign off with some remarks from Jamie, a new volunteer, about being involved with ALGA:

Events and Activities Esther Singer

Sharing the GLBTQ histories that we collect with the community through public events is one of the most enjoyable parts of the work we do at ALGA. In 2008 we tried to do this in as many ways and places as we could through a series of new and old events. Our **Queer History Quiz Spectacular** kicked off the year at Midsumma and was a sell-out success. Live re-enactments of history moments amused the punters and we hope the questions gave everyone a chance to show off some of their historical know-how. Midsumma continued with a great **history walk** around Carlton and a very special collaboration with the Rainbow Network youth groups for **Pride March**. After a great banner making workshop with some of the young people from the network it was wonderful to take a stroll down Fitzroy St again and very heartening to hear a few 'yay Archives!' shouts from the crowd.

Our **Open Days** were another big hit this year and we were overwhelmed by the crowds – especially for our celebration of the Australasian Lesbian Movement at the April Open Day. Phyllis Papps and Francesca Curtis had the crowd entranced with their stories of the ALM's early days and we were very grateful they travelled down from Phillip Island to be with us.

As winter came along we decided some nice cosy chats might do the trick and so the inaugural ALGA **Winter Lectures** series was born. Graham Willett and Simon Matthews took up the challenge discussing law reform and homo bush rangers respectively.

More lectures filled a busy weekend in July as the Archives once again presented **Homosexual Histories**: the conference. It's always a great chance to hear what people are digging up in the world of GLBT histories and it was wonderful to see researchers from right across the country swapping tales with students and the just plain curious.

All this set the stage for our grand **gala birthday party** – a glorious opportunity to celebrate queer histories from across Australia with the irrepressible Julie McCrossin taking us on a whirlwind tour. We hope you made it along to one of our events in 2008 and learned a new history tidbit or shared a tale or two. We're always looking for new ideas for sharing histories with the community, and new volunteers to help in this task so please do get in touch. Or if you are more inclined to taking it all in, we hope to see you at an Archives event in the new year!

Work on the collection Gary Jaynes

Many sorts of preservation, listing and accessioning projects get undertaken at the Archives. Most of these aim to keep the collection in good condition and make it more easily accessed by visitors.

Work done on the collection this year has included:

- indexing of *Camp Ink* (1970-77) completed by Lee Johns (title, author, date, issue, abstract, 1012 records).
- listing at the document level of national homosexual conference records (1975-86) continued by Liz Ross first 10 conferences completed (1670+ records so far)
- digitising and listing of photographs from the estate of the late Jan Hillier, listing and rehousing of photographs of Queen's Birthday picnics (1970s) donated by Yvonne Gardner, listing and rehousing miscellaneous 1980s photos Esther Singer, Roz Ward and Gary Jaynes
- listing of objects collection by Johnathon McLay
- listing of ephemera (flyers, film leaflets etc) by Sofia Lo Bianco and Rachael Cilauro
- conservation work on the HLRC collection by Jamie Brown
- listing of the papers of Bill Hathaway by Joan Nestle
- select listing of ephemera files for public access by Graham Willett
- digitising of *Melbourne Truth* references on homosexual topics from microfilm at State Library Victoria now 297 done items in the period 1938-67, by Gary Jaynes
- electronic summaries of press clippings supplied by Peter de Waal for vol 1 of his *Unfit for Publication : NSW Supreme Court and other bestiality, buggery and sodomy trials 1727-1930* the vol 1 clippings cover 1808-1910 (314 items)
- conducting oral history interviews (six done in past year) Helen Pausacker has assisted with logging
- digitisation of VHS footage of Midsumma Carnival events 1992-1999 (16 DVDs) videos loaned by Colin Billing, digitisation cost shared by ALGA and Midsumma
- updates of ALGA's periodicals list to 31.12.2006 by Graham Carbery fourth revision at Sep 2008, also lists of indexed periodicals and the beginnings of a chronology of Australian GLBT periodicals see the Collections part of ALGA's website.
- updates of ALGA's book collection and a list of books that ALGA would like to obtain.
- processing of new acquisitions (approx 60 in past year) involves arrangement, listing, and where appropriate, producing a preservation copy.
- devising a transfer agreement for new acquisitions thanks to Jason Benjamin for advice
- select listing of queer youth materials (e.g. Young Gays ephemera files etc) by Daniel Marshall

Collection tasks planned for the future when resources permit

We are currently seeking volunteers, equipment, funds and expertise to undertake the following tasks in 2009:

- a backup of ALGA's analogue cassettes in digital format is on hold until we have high quality playback equipment.
- developing a comprehensive key-word cataloguing system that brings together our many lists and databases (a grant sought from the Federal Government's Grants to Voluntary Environment and Heritage Organisations program has been sought to enable this.)

- logging the remaining oral history interviews. We have 120 interviews in total, of which 92 are logged. We also hope the GVEHO will support this.
- devising and implementing a preservation plan for scrap books that are in frail condition (a Local History Grant from the Public Records Office Victoria has been sought to progress this.)
- devising and implementing a digitisation program for the poster collection, and listing posters obtained in the past 18 months.
- computer listing of binders of broadsheet size press clippings from 1970s and 80s which are not chronologically ordered and hard to access. These are also not photocopied, so deteriorating newsprint is a consideration (these pre-date the electronic databases of press clippings)
- indexing a major lesbian-specific periodical (eg Lesbian Newsletter or any its successors in Melbourne such as Lesbian News, Labrys, Lesbiana, or for Sydney LOTL)
- scoping of any of the major personal or organisational collections held by ALGA.

Community Access Esther Singer

One of the great joys of volunteering at the Archives is getting to meet some of the people who come to see and use the collection and witnessing their surprise and excitement at encountering such a treasure trove of GLBT history. A steady stream of researchers and other visitors flows through ALGA and it always highlights the importance of our work and the collections we maintain.

Researchers in 2008 have been working on a great range of topics and projects. Rebecca Jennings came down from Sydney to use our lesbian oral histories and view the new Australasian Lesbian Movement collection. She's a research fellow at Macquarie University working on a history of early lesbian life in Sydney and this was her second trip to visit ALGA.

Students at all levels are regular visitors. Topics being researched ranged from AIDS activism in the 1980s to a design for a prototype queer monument. Others wanted to view early Gay Lib documents or newspaper clippings on transgender issues in the 1950s. The breadth of the collection and the numerous catalogues and listings are always appreciated by researchers.

More casual visitors also appreciate the collection. One man popped in while on a trip down from Queensland to view an issue of *Australian Golden Boys* from the early 1970s. He was a model but had never seen the magazine as it was banned in Queensland at the time!

Meanwhile, the editors from gay art magazine, *They Shoot Homos Don't They*, visited a number of times to view our collection of David McDiarmid's AIDS inspired art and to photograph some of our posters collection. The posters also feature in the 2009 Art of Dissent calendar produced by 3CR radio. A number of requests to view our poster collection has reminded us of the rare graphic art we hold and the urgent need to make it accessible through digitisation.

We also love hosting groups of visitors and sharing some insights into GLBT history. One highlight was a visit from young people organised by the Rainbow Network. It's wonderful getting to share our collection with people who've never had the chance to learn about GLBT history, and the enthusiasm they bring is always contagious.

When people can't come to us we try and bring the collection to them, through displays and stalls. Our stall at Chill Out was a great success, giving us the opportunity to meet many rural GLBT folks we might not usually see. A small exhibition organised as part of the national queer students conference, Queer Collaborations, was also very popular. We also love to talk with small groups

and organisations when invited. We visited YAK (a group for young GLBT people) at their request and they loved seeing a slideshow of collection highlights and talking about queer histories. Taking the collection out and tending to visitors requests certainly keeps us busy but it's at the heart of why we collect GLBT histories and always richly rewarding.

Other visitors over the year included:

- Shannon Woodcock (La Trobe University) and Shermal Wijewardene (Monash University) researching perceptions of race and culture in *LOTL* magazine.
- Rachel Cook has been a frequent visitor, working on her GLBT history book for younger readers.
- Daren Pope (aka Kaye Sera) visited to research an upcoming Midsumma show on the gay past of Melbourne City.
- Shirleene Robinson visited from Queensland to research the gay press and responses to homophobia for her book.
- Dr Emily Wilson, came down from the Gold Coast to research attitudes among medical professionals towards homosexuality in Australia in the 1950s and 1960s.
- Kayla Davidson researched gay life in the 1980s as background for a film script in development.

Explanatory note re ALGA's three accounts:

The Gift a/c is where all tax deductible donations are deposited (a Tax Office requirement); the Ordinary a/c is where all other income and all operating expenses occur; and the Investment a/c is where funds that are not needed for short term operating purposes are transferred (enabling a higher interest rate return).

Details of income and expenditure in the three accounts, and comparisons with the previous financial year, are contained in Attachments A, B and C.

Notes about pre-commitments

- 1. There is a pre-commitment of approximately \$500 for auditor's services (requirement of the \$2300 grant from the GVEHO program. This grant also funded administration expenses (\$1275) and 50% of the \$992 purchase cost of a digital camera.
- 2. \$8,000 of the \$10,791 income in the investment account is from the City of Melbourne for production costs for a book on Gay and Lesbian Melbourne not yet expended. Although this is a pre-commitment, all proceeds from sale of the book will benefit ALGA in future years.
- 3. Up to \$1000 of specific purpose donation income is reserved for book purchases (a prioritized list of book acquisitions is under review, and avenues for obtaining at least some of these by donation are being explored).

After allowing for the pre-commitments above, the year end balance of \$51,386 is effectively \$22,000 better than the previous year's balance.

The fund raising campaign built around the Archives' 30th anniversary in 2008 generated \$27,045 in donations to the Gift account, compared with \$5719 in 2006-07, \$5785 in 2005-06, \$5685 in 2004-05. Attachment B gives details. There were 84 separate donations compared with 53 last year. Donations in all categories were more numerous this year: 65 donations up to \$100 (\$3348 total) compared with 46 last year (\$1713); 19 donations of more than \$100 (\$23,689) compared with seven last year (\$3980).

Specific purpose donations

It is clear that ALGA supporters are attracted to donating towards tangible and enduring outcomes. The scheme by which donations of \$50 or more can be acknowledged with a slip pasted in bound volumes of periodicals (and a mounted replica given to the donor) was extended to book purchases in 2008. The extension was trialled for one year with a view to enabling ALGA to acquire significant books about aspects of homosexual life in Australia, past or present, when it is unlikely that we can obtain that work by donation.

Donations for these specific purposes accounted for \$7384 compared with \$3825 last year. The specific purpose donations scheme has been over-subscribed this year — only about half of the \$7384 being needed for binding and book purchases. It is proposed to revise the scheme in the coming year to allow donors to allow specific purpose donations associated with improving ALGA's accommodation (eg. purchases of shelving, a compactus and possibly additional computers). Specific purpose donations for binding will continue to be encouraged.

As with other donations to ALGA, specific purpose donations are tax deductible.

Abnormal vs ongoing costs

There were some abnormal items in the Ordinary a/c this year:

- ALGA's 30th birthday party (\$11.2K income, \$12K expense, ie operating loss of about \$800, in line with a budgeted loss of up to \$1K).
- Homosexual Histories 8 conference (\$2061 income, \$1051 costs)
- Quiz Night (\$1478 income, \$125 costs)
- GVEHO grant for administration (\$2.3K) expended on admin services \$1.3K, equipment \$496 and (pre-commitment) approx \$500 for audit services.
- \$750 for three Thesis Prizes (two years awarded retrospectively)
- \$1780 for shelving to house ALGA's book collection, and \$484 to relocate the collection

After allowing for these abnormal expenditures (approx \$18K), the cost of running the Archives in 2007-08 was about \$9,000. This is slightly more than the \$7,000 it cost to run the Archives in 2006-07, the increase mainly due to binding (up from \$1430 to \$2020), printing (\$756 for production costs of the Future Fund brochure), and 50% of the \$992 cost of a digital camera (the balance funded by the GVEHO grant).

As noted, binding costs were more than offset by specific purpose donations, and the printing cost of the Future Fund brochure was more than offset by some large donations to the Future Fund and the in-kind donation of services of designer Lin Tobias for which we are very grateful.

While Gift account income of more than \$27K provided the lion's share of ALGA's income, there were other sources. Membership income increased (\$1762, up from \$1214 in 2006-07); there were profits from the Quiz night (\$1.4K) and the Homosexual Histories conference (\$1K); and interest in the investment a/c contributed about \$2.2K (up from \$787 the previous year).
