1985 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Our Treasurer, John Willis, submitted his Financial Report for the thirteen months ending 31 August, 1985 which shows a balance of \$1863.38. Of this amount \$1024 has been earmarked specifically for the photocopier fund.

The Archives was a winner too because we made a net profit of \$752.20.



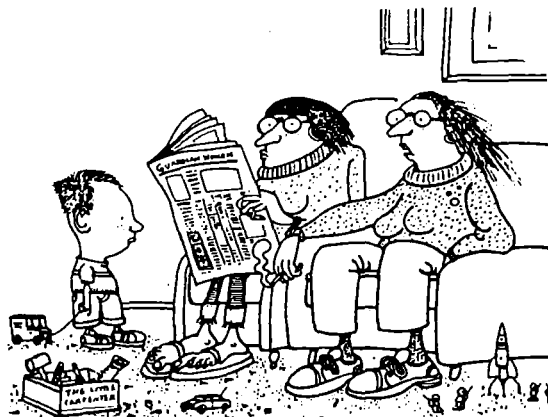

REPORT ON PERIODICALS

We are very interested in receiving criticism/comment about information contained in the list and about the way in which it is presented.

11th NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF LESBIANS & HOMOSEXUAL MEN

Next year's conference will be in Sydney on the Anzac Day long week-end. The Archives plans to convene two workshops at the conference.

One workshop will deal with the work of the Archives over the past year and outline a plan of events for the ensuing year. We see this workshop as being important as it is one way in which we are accountable to our interstate supporters who are unable to take a more active part in our operations.

The second workshop will discuss various archival practices such as, the types of material which might be of archival value and how to house and access the various types of material.

Greg is currently studying for his Doctorate at the University of Melbourne's Department of Indian and Indonesian Studies. A recent scholarship has enabled him to continue his study in The Netherlands where he will be attached to the Werkgroep Europese Expansie (Centre for the Study of European Expansion) at Leiden University. Greg will carry out research in a number of Christian Mission archives which will form the basis for his thesis on Christian Missions in West Java in the late 19th century.
